A reading from the book of Nehemiah (Nehemiah 8:2-6. 8-10)
Ezra the priest brought the Law before the assembly, consisting of men, women, and children old enough to understand. This was the first day of the seventh month. On the square before the Water Gate, in the presence of the men and women, and children old enough to understand, he read from the book from early morning till noon; all the people listened aftentively to the Book of the Law.
Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden dais erected for the purpose. In full view of all the people — since he stood higher than all the people — Ezra opened the book; and when he opened it all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people raised their hands and answered Amen! Second Reading

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (1 Cor 12:12-30) Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink.

Nor is the body to be identified with account. all to drink.

Nor is the body to be identified with any one of its many parts. If the foot were to say, 'I am not a hand and so I do not belong to the body', would that mean that it stopped being part of the body? If the ear were to say, 'I am not an eye, and so I do not belong to the body,' would that mean that it is not a part of the body? If your whole body was just one eye, how would you hear anything? If it was just one ear, how would you smell anything? Instead of that, God put all the separate parts into the body on purpose. If all the parts were the same, how could it be a body? As it is, the parts are many but the

body is one. The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I do not need you,' nor can the head say to the feet, 'I do not need you.'
What is more, it is precisely the parts of the body that seem to be the weakest which are the indispensable ones; and it is the least honourable parts of the body that we clothe with the greatest care. So our more improper parts get decorated in a way that our more proper parts do not need. God has arranged the body so that more dignity is given to the parts which are without it, and so that there may not be disagreements inside the body, but that each part may be equally concerned for all the others. If one part is hurt, all parts are hurt with it. If one part is given special honour, all parts enjoy it.

Now you together are Christ's body; but each of you is a different part of it. In the Church, God has given the first place to apostles, the second to prophets, the third to teachers; after them, miracles, and after them the gift of healing; helpers, good leaders, those with many languages. Are all of them apostles, or all of them prophets, or all of them prophets, or all of them prophets, or all of them teachers? Do they all have the gift of miracles, or all have the gift of healing? Do all speak strange languages, and all interpret them?

From Fr Mani's desk...

Why 2025 Jubilee Year?

Jubilee year comes every 25 years in the Church. Since 1300 the Church took up the tradition of Jubilee Year every 50 years and eventually it became 25 years. The roots of this are traced to the Jewish tradition of marking every 50 years a jubilee year (Leviticus 25/8-13). For the Jews it was a time to reestablish a proper relationship with God, with one another and with all of creation, involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land and a rest for the land by not cultivating. This Jubilee year is a great opportunity for the church and individuals to receive special graces from the Lord like the chosen people of Israel.

Pope Francis opened the Holy Door in St Peter's Basilica on 24 December 2024 signifying the Jubilee year and will run through to 6 January 2026. Pope Francis chose 'Pilgrims of Hope' as the theme for this Holy Year. The sign of hope means a desire for peace, an openness to life and special attention to prisoners and the sick, migrants, young people, the elderly and the disadvantaged. As Pope Francis has noted: 'The Jubilee has always been an event of great spiritual, ecclesial and social significance in the life of the Church ... God's holy and faithful people has experienced this celebration as a special gift of grace, characterized by the forgiveness of sins and in particular by the indulgence which is a full expression of the mercy of God'.

The Catholic Church believes that Christ and the saints have accumulated a treasure of merits which other believers who are prayerful and repentant can draw upon; to reduce or erase the temporal punishment they are due because of their sins. Making a pilgrimage, going to Confession and receiving Holy Communion and offering prayers for the intentions of Holy Father to receive an indulgence is a key part of celebrating the Holy Year.

Tuesday 28 January - St Thomas Aquinas

Born near Aquino (Italy) about 1225. Died on his way to the Council of Lyons in 1274. Educated at Monte Cassino, Naples, Paris, and Cologne, he became a Dominican in 1244. Regarded as one of the greatest theologians in the history of the Church. Despite ecclesiastical opposition at the time, the substance of his life's work has endured as an authentic exposition of Christian teaching and carries unique official approval. Remembered for his modesty, the prayerfulness of his personal life, and the abiding influence of his thought. Mass 9.15am

Friday 31 January - St John Bosco

Born in Piedmont (Italy) in 1815. died at Turin on this day in 1888. Grew up in extreme poverty and, after ordination, devoted his whole life to educating young people, especially the poor. Founded the Salesians, men and women who continue this work with youth throughout the world. Remembered - like the order's patron, Saint Francis de Sales (24 January) - for his cheerfulness and total trust in the providence of God. Mass at 9.15am
