Fr. Brendan Byrne SJ is Professor of New Testament at Jesuit Theological College, Melbourne. His book and this method have been successfully tried in other parishes.



From Fr Mani's desk...

2nd Sunday of Lent

All the readings of today have a reference to mountains. We have Abraham on Mount Moriah, the redeeming Christ on Mount Calvary and the Transfigured Christ on Mount Tabor. We are invited to climb these mountains during Lent. Mountain climbing is exciting though hard. When we reach the top, we see things in a different way. The air is cleaner, the light is clearer; we seem closer to the Almighty.

Abraham was called by God to leave his own people and the familiar surroundings and go to a place God intended - Mount Moriah. He followed the command of God like an obedient child and he was even asked to sacrifice his own son Isaac there. God rewarded and approved his faith and blessed him and made him father of the great nation.

St. Paul in the second reading speaks about Christ's love for us, shown on Mount Calvary. During Lent we are called to embrace more fully the love of Jesus and see Him as our only Savior. To climb the hill of Calvary is to leave all the ungodliness and imperfections behind us and see Jesus alone, the way, the truth and the life and to embrace His death and resurrection as our key to life.

Finally there is Mount Tabor, the mountain where Jesus is transfigured. Cross and suffering was a sign of shame and stumbling block. After this event the disciples became changed men carrying with them not only a firsthand glimpse of God's majesty but the identity of Jesus as the son of God. This vision remained in their mind as a source of strength for them during the coming passion and death of Jesus. God is watching every suffering of His children and when we accept it joyfully from Him like Jesus, He will say to us also, "This is my beloved son, daughter..."

The Eucharist functions like the mountains: a privileged means for us to encounter the divine. Hence we should go to church as we would trek a mountain leaving behind all distractions truly seeking God with our whole being. Only then do we find him there, always present eagerly anticipating. And then our own transfiguration may begin and we can exclaim together with Peter: "Lord, it is good that we are here." We will be able to hear the phone ringing and God is on the other end of the line.

LENTEN PENANCE

In this season of Lent, we seek to experience the mercy of God the Father, and to practice it in our daily lives. But first we must experience our need for mercy, that is, our brokenness and, indeed, our sinfulness, insofar as we have failed to love God above all, and to love our fellow men and women as ourselves. This is why the Church's Canon Law reaffirms the obligation to do penance – to interrupt the usual comforts of life, to rediscover in prayer the merciful love of God, and to practice charity and justice towards those in need. The special times of penance are all Fridays throughout the year and the season of Lent.

We recall that St John the Baptist prepared for the coming of the Lord by "preaching a baptism of repentance". Jesus began his ministry with the exhortation: "Repent and believe the Gospel" (Mk 1:15). Repentance means the rejection of sin. It implies conversion to, and reconciliation with, God. Prayer, self-denial, and works of charity are the concrete expressions of repentance. Each of these identifies us more closely with our Saviour. By penance we make satisfaction for our sins, and take real steps in the renewal of our lives. Repentance and conversion are central, on-going, and even daily practices of Christian living.

In nominating special times of penance, the Church encourages and promotes in all of us the *habit* of penance. Furthermore, observance of these special times by all Catholics throughout the universal Church emphasises what we call "the social dimension of sin". The sin of the individual member always in some measure infects the whole body. Therefore during Lent and on every Friday throughout the year, we do penance, not only on our own account, but also in the name of the Church and of the world. We must take very seriously our penitential obligations and be sure to carry them out. The Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference has not restricted our penance to fast and abstinence; in all cases, it has left room for our own responsible choice. We should carefully select the form of penance that we consider most appropriate for our own circumstances and growth in the Christian life.

DAYS OF PENANCE

- 1. Abstinence from meat, and fasting, <u>must</u> be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. All who have completed their eighteenth year and have not yet begun their sixtieth year are bound to fast. All who have completed their fourteenth year are bound to abstain.
- 2. On all other Fridays of the year including the Fridays of Lent, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled by performing any one of the following:
 - (a) prayer for example, Mass attendance; family prayer; a visit to a church or chapel; reading the Bible; making the Stations of the Cross; praying the rosary.
 - (b) self-denial for example, not eating meat; not eating sweets or dessert; giving up entertainment to spend time with the family; limiting food and drink so as to give to the poor of one's own country; limiting use of social media, smart phones or television.
 - (c) helping others for example, special attention to someone who is poor, sick, elderly, lonely or overburdened.

LENT LASTS FROM ASH WEDNESDAY (5^{th} MARCH) TO THE MASS OF THE LORD'S SUPPER (17^{th} APRIL). ON GOOD FRIDAY AND, IF POSSIBLE, ALSO ON HOLY SATURDAY UNTIL THE EASTER VIGIL, THE EASTER FAST IS OBSERVED.

PASCHAL PRECEPT

Each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This is to be done between Ash Wednesday, 5th March, and Trinity Sunday, 15th June, 2025 unless for a good reason it is done at another time during the year. All the faithful are obliged to confess their grave sins at least once a year.

ARCHBISHOP OF SYDNEY

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DECREE ON THE PROCLAMATION OF PLACES OF PILGRIMAGE IN THE ARCHDIOCESE OF SYDNEY ON THE OCCASION OF THE JUBILEE YEAR OF OUR LORD 2025

The Holy Father has proclaimed 2025 as a year of Ordinary Jubilee and has invited all the faithful to full participation. Therefore:

Having regard to the Bull of Pope Francis Spes non confundit - "Hope does not disappoint" of 9th May 2024;

Noting the Norms promulgated by the Apostolic Penitentiary of 13th May 2024 regarding indulgences in the Ordinary Jubilee Year of 2025;

Recognising the significance of this Jubilee Year as the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea;

In accordance with the authority vested in me as the local Ordinary, from the date of this Decree until the closing of the Jubilee Year on 28th December 2025:

- A. I ask that all priests of the Archdiocese of Sydney make use of the Nicene Creed (rather than the Apostles' Creed) on Sundays and Solemnities in 2025;
- B. I designate the following churches as Places of Pilgrimage where full Jubilee Indulgences may be obtained, under the usual conditions:
 - i. St Mary's Cathedral, Sydney;
 - ii. St Patrick's Church, Church Hill
 - iii. The Shrine of St Mary of the Cross, North Sydney;
- iv. The Shrine of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Waterloo;
- v. St Brigid's Church, Coogee
- vi. Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Church, Randwick
- vii. St Anne's Church, Bondi Beach
- viii. All Saints Catholic Church, Liverpool
- ix. Holy Spirit Church, Carnes Hill
- x. St Joachim's Church, Lidcombe
- xi. St Brigid's Church, Marrickville
- xii. St Catherine Laboure Church, Gymea

All pilgrims who comply with the usual conditions for an indulgence i.e. receive the Sacrament of Penance, attend Mass, receive the Most Holy Eucharist and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, will receive a full Jubilee Indulgence upon pilgrimage to any of the churches designated above.



What is indulgence?

An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain defined conditions through the Church's help. A plenary (meaning "full") indulgence is a special type of indulgence that, if all the requirements are met, removes **all** temporal punishment due to one's sin. The church uses the power of the keys given to St. Peter by Jesus in Scripture (Matthew 16:18) to remove temporal consequences that still remain from sins committed. Even if we have been forgiven of a particular sin, we still experience the consequences of that sin in our lives.

To obtain an indulgence, Catholics in the state of grace must:

Go to confession

Receive Holy Communion

Pray for the intentions of the Holy Father

The faithful who devoutly visit the churches mentioned by our Archbishop and participate in any sacred rite or at least recite the Lord's Prayer and the profession of faith may obtain a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions listed above. Plenary indulgence is for the remission of one's own sins or of those died.
